SADC TFCA NETWORK MEETING – 15^{TH} TO 18^{TH} OCTOBER 2018 SAWC, HOEDSPRUIT, SOUTH AFRICA

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INSTITUTIONAL STATUS AND UPDATE – TFCA STATUS

- KAZA TFCA No change in the TFCA Status.
- 7th December 2006: Ministers of the 5 KAZA partner states signed the MoU to establish the KAZA TFCA.
- **18th August 2011**: Heads of States of the 5 partner states signed the Treaty to formally establish the KAZA TFCA.
- **Treaty Ratification** Four partner states have ratified it.
- **Operational TFCA Secretariat structure** under the guidance of the Executive Director.
- Hosting Agreement At final of being signed by Hosting State.
- **Coordinating Country role -** Shifted from Angola to Botswana though official handover is pending.
- **KAZA Master IDP** Started implementation with focus on benefit flow to the local communities in WDAs.



INSTITUTIONAL STATUS AND UPDATE – TFCA UPDATES

KAZA M&E system

- Evolved from basic progress tracking to impact monitoring > KAZA Indicator Framework.
- Collaborative development with partners.
- -KAZA Impact Monitoring Working Group facilitation:
 - Development of user-friendly spatial monitoring tool that enables multiple parties to assess change in biological & socio-economic indicators;
 - Monitor performance against the set baselines;
 - Data is used for the online M&E application or for map production/ business intelligence; and
 - All data relating to the M&E system is only related to the partner states.
- -Stakeholder Management and M&E Manager on board.
- Increasingly expected to be used for impact monitoring & serve as a knowledge management tool and learning outputs for adaptive management.
- KAZA M&E system was incorporated into the KAZA website which allows the public to view some of the M&E aspect of the KAZA TFCA.



INSTITUTIONAL STATUS AND UPDATES CONT'D

- New documents/products
 - KAZA Mid-Term Report.
 - -KAZA UNIVISA system was successfully integrated into the mainstream Immigration departments of both Zambia and Zimbabwe.
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 - -KAZA UNIVISA integration & interfacing between Zambia and Zimbabwe done.

 - The rollout to the KAZA TFCA Partner States was conducted in June 2018.
 - Effective collaboration between KAZA Secretariat and GIZ/Boundless Southern Africa over joint marketing of KAZA TFCA at the ITB, Germany in March 2018.
 - Several Working Group meetings took place during the reporting period.
 - Wildlife diseases trainings in Partner States.



FUTURE PLANS – GENERAL FOR KAZA TFCA

- Establishing baselines and supporting workshops in the Partner States on the developed KAZA M&E Tools and systems results.
- Develop a maintenance plan for the systems which support active monitoring and updating.
- KAZA Revisioning workshop.
- Support the planned roadshows of the KAZA UNIVISA system in the other three Partner States.
- Host 2018 KAZA Press Trip.
- Host and facilitate the 2019 Landrover expedition.
- Implement the KAZA Master IDP.
- Start Phase III implementation.
- Implement the communications and advocacy strategy.
- Implement the financial sustainability plan focusing on donor diversification, income growth, impact-driven fundraising.



CONSTRAINTS AND ADDED VALUE

Constraints:

•Weak project/programme pipeline and narrow donor base which results in a number of various activities including the M&E not being implemented.

- •Poor communication mechanism.
- •Unclear role of Secretariat facilitator or implementer.

•Phasing out of KLOs in Phase III funding may pose implementation challenges.

Added value:

•KAZA offers opportunities to work at scale.

•Freshwater, climate change and forest, etc. – some of the key areas to expand scope of interventions.



HOW CAN THE SADC TFCAS UNIT HELP?

- Sustainable financing.
- M&E align KAZA indicator framework with the SADC TFCA Network framework.
- Communication for influencing, multiplication and impact.
- Knowledge management and learning for adaptive management.
- Support KAZA TFCA to engage other stakeholders to expand scope of interventions.
- Support local institutions and communities in ensuring that METT and SMART are applied in all relevant KAZA supported activities.
- Assist to develop an understanding of the full scale of the risks being faced – a risk profile (e.g. through scenario planning processes) for KAZA to help prioritise further interventions.
