

ESTABLISHMENT AND CAPITALIZATION OF ENDOWMENT FUNDS

Mozambique – BIOFUND - First <u>national</u> endowment fund in southern Africa

IDA (World Bank) + GEF financing

Endowment Fund – GEF financing

- 2015 First disbursement of US\$3.2 million
- 2018 Second disbursement expected through GEF 7 financing – under preparation

Technical Assistance – IDA financing

- 2014 2018: covering the operational costs of Biofund >
 allowing endowment fund capital gains to be fully used in PA
 management in initial years
- 2019 2024 Continued support to operational costs, with new functions – particularly building capacity of local leaders on conservation

Amazon Region Protected Areas Program (ARPA)

World Bank (IDA) + GEF Financing + FUNBIO

- Brazilian Biodiversity Fund (FUNBIO) that was created in 2004
- Following success of FUNBIO, an ARPA Endowment Fund of US \$121.3 million was created with annual disbursements to selected PAs
- Establishing, expanding and strengthening the protection of 60 million hectares of rainforest.

NATURE BASED TOURISM: CURRENT PORTFOLIO (>400 MI)



Nepal: \$80 million for value creation, sustainability and inclusiveness of the tourism sector at selected destinations

Sri Lanka: US\$45 million to improve biodiversity conservation and US \$ 6 million specifically to enhance quality of NBT for visitors and establishing NBT guidelines



MOZAMBIQUE CONSERVATION AREAS FOR BIODIVERSITY AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (MOZBIO)

World Bank Involvement

- US\$40 Million (IDA)
- US\$6 Million (GEF)
- 4 year duration (2014 2018)
- Next Phase: MOZBI 2.0 US\$ 45 million (IDA) + US\$13.5 million (GEF 7)

Regularized 3 tourism concessions



Signed 2 co-management agreements



Construction of vital tourism infrastructure

World Bank Involvement

■ US\$150 Million (IDA) - to improve management of natural resources and tourism assets in priority areas of Southern Tanzania and to increase access to alternative livelihood activities for targeted communities.





Activities



Improve the country's capacity to conserve its wildlife as basis to attract tourists



Improve infrastructure and upgrade roads in the Southern Circuit



Increased economic benefits to 20,000 households through conservation friendly livelihoods



Strengthen "Destination Southern Tanzania" – tourism product development, skills training & marketing

- Currently identifying candidate areas





STRENGTHENING REGULATIONS AND REGULATORY CAPACITY FOR PPP – THE CASE OF ANAC IN MOZAMBIQUE

- Mozbio 2 project (US\$45 million IDA / World Bank) will support Mozambique's ANAC in strengthening its institutional and human capacity
- Establishment of a Business Management Unit
- PPP specialist
- Tourism specialist
- Marketing specialist
- In past, support to develop regulations on tourism concessions in PAs
- IFC Anchor project to support countries in developing regulations
- Support in negotiating initial delas (such as Chemucane in Maputo Special Reserve)



Gile National Reserve: biodiversity hotspot






ZAMBEZIA - BENEFIT SHARING PLAN

Performance based: Payment will occur only if deforestation is reduced.

- 70% to delimited communities in the forest area
- 10% districts, province and the <u>Gile National</u>
 <u>Reserve</u>
 - Gile REDD+ Plans
- 20% to private sector
 - Matching Grant

CONSERVATION AREA

BUFFER ZONE

Environmental Awareness

Environmental awareness and education campaigns through the use of cultural activities including local community radio programs (including family planning messages);

- Support to girls and environmental clubs, scholarships to local youth and promotion of vocational training;
- Strengthening CBOs among local communities
- a pilot of payments for ecosystem services (PES) in MSR;
- Small works to promote human-wildlife co-existence in selected CA landscapes.

OUTSIDE AREA

Matching Grant Scheme

- Promotion of conservationcompatible value chains (agriculture, fisheries, tourism, nontimber forest products...);
- Financial literacy of local communities through the establishment of Saving and Credit Groups (PCRs).

MGS will target local entrepreneurs, CBOs, and micro, small, and medium enterprises.

TAKE AWAY MESSAGES -WHERE IS THE MONEY? Endowment funds



- Keep administrative costs low
- Offer services beyond financing, show results (M&E)
- Clear and transparent procedures for allocating fund resources to the field
- Clear division of roles between Fund and Protected Area authority

2. Environment services – slow to emerge, but potential

How much ecosystem services does the PA generate? First step!

3. Private sector

- investments in nature-based tourism
- private concessions
- biodiversity offsets
